3	CALL 301	Farsi Script	12 weeks	3	Detailed study and practice of Farsi calligraphy, focusing on its elongated letters, sweeping curves, and artistic flourishes used primarily in Persian manuscripts.
3	CALL 302	Kufi Script	12 weeks	3	Detailed study and practice of Kufi calligraphy, known for its geometric forms, angularity, and historical significance in early Qur'anic inscriptions and architectural decorations.
3	CALL 303	Advanced Calligraphy Techniques	12 weeks	3	Exploration of advanced calligraphy techniques, including variations in pen angles, strokes, and stylization methods, along with contemporary adaptations and applications.
4	CALL 304	Capstone Project	12 weeks	4	Comprehensive project demonstrating the student's mastery of multiple scripts. Students will create a significant calligraphy piece integrating various styles and techniques learned.
4	CALL 305	Examination and Portfolio Review	4 weeks	2	Final assessment of the student's calligraphic skills, including a thorough review and critique of their portfolio by a panel of expert calligraphers.

5. Course Breakdown:

1. Thuluth Script (CALL 201):

- Provides an in-depth understanding of Thuluth calligraphy, known for its large and elegant letters with elongated verticals.
- Covers the script's historical evolution, technical aspects, and usage in both traditional and modern contexts.
- Includes practical sessions to develop control over the complex letterforms and spacing requirements.



2. Naskh Script (CALL 202):

- Focuses on the Naskh script, which is widely used in Arabic books and manuscripts.
- Teaches proportional rules, uniform strokes, and rounded letter shapes that make Naskh easily readable.
- Emphasizes consistency, rhythm, and refinement in script writing.

3. Diwani Script (CALL 203):

- Offers comprehensive training in the Diwani script, characterized by its fluid and cursive form.
- Covers the unique stylistic elements of Diwani, including its ornamental and compact nature, which is often used in official documents.
- Engages students in exercises to master the flowing lines and interlaced letters that define this script.

4. Ruqaa Script (CALL 204):

- Teaches the fundamentals and applications of the Ruqaa script, known for its simplicity and speed.
- Focuses on practical usage, such as writing notes, headlines, and official correspondence.
- Includes hands-on exercises for developing proficiency and fluency in writing with Ruqaa.

5. Farsi Script (CALL 301):

- Explores the aesthetics and nuances of Farsi calligraphy, used primarily in Persian art and literature.
- Teaches students the distinctive elongated shapes and sweeping curves that characterize the Farsi style.
- Provides practice in creating compositions that highlight the script's unique elegance.

6. Kufi Script (CALL 302):

- Offers a detailed study of Kufi, the oldest calligraphic form, known for its angular, rectilinear style.
- Teaches the geometric construction and ornamental variations of the script, emphasizing its use in religious texts and architectural design.
- Encourages creativity in exploring the various decorative forms of Kufi.
