5. Course Breakdown:

1. Islamic Calligraphy Techniques (CALL 701):

- Focuses on mastering the calligraphic styles traditionally used in Islamic manuscripts, including Naskh, Thuluth, Diwani, and Kufic scripts.
- Emphasizes precision, consistency, and aesthetic qualities in writing, along with the cultural and religious significance of different styles.
- Students will develop skills in creating traditional calligraphic compositions and using various tools, such as reed pens and specialized inks.

2. Illumination Techniques (CALL 702):

- Teaches the decorative techniques used in the illumination of Islamic manuscripts, such as gold leafing, miniature painting, and the use of floral and geometric motifs.
- Covers the use of natural pigments, brush techniques, and the application of decorative borders and frames.
- Students will practice creating illuminated pages, learning to integrate these decorations with calligraphic text.



3. Historical Manuscripts (CALL 703):

- Offers a comprehensive study of historical Islamic manuscripts, focusing on their artistic, cultural, and spiritual significance.
- Covers the evolution of calligraphy and illumination styles from different Islamic periods, including Abbasid, Ottoman, Mamluk, and Safavid eras.
- Analyzes famous manuscripts, such as the Blue Quran, the Topkapi Scroll, and other significant works, to understand their historical contexts and artistic techniques.

4. Practical Illumination Projects (CALL 704):

- Provides hands-on experience in creating illuminated calligraphic works, applying the techniques learned in CALL 702.
- Encourages creativity and experimentation within the framework of traditional styles and methods.
- Students will produce several pieces of illuminated calligraphy, working towards creating a cohesive body of work suitable for exhibition.

5. Advanced Manuscript Restoration (CALL 705):

- Focuses on the techniques for restoring and preserving historical manuscripts, including methods for repairing damage, cleaning, and protecting delicate materials.
- Covers both traditional restoration techniques and modern conservation practices.
- Students will learn to assess the condition of manuscripts, determine appropriate restoration methods, and understand ethical considerations in conservation.

6. Capstone Project (CALL 706):

- Involves a comprehensive project that demonstrates the student's ability to combine calligraphy and illumination techniques to create a complete manuscript or illuminated piece.
- The project should reflect a high level of artistic and technical skill, as well as a deep understanding of historical styles and cultural contexts.
- Students will present their project to a panel of experts for evaluation and feedback.

7. Examination and Portfolio Review (CALL 707):

- The final assessment includes a detailed review of the student's portfolio, which should feature all completed works from the program, including illuminated manuscripts, calligraphic pieces, and restoration projects.
- A panel of experts in Islamic art and calligraphy will evaluate the portfolio based on artistic quality, technical proficiency, historical accuracy, and creativity.
