5. Course Breakdown:

1. History of Arabic Calligraphy (CALL 901):

- Focuses on the historical evolution of Arabic calligraphy, covering key styles such as Kufic, Naskh, Thuluth, Diwani, and more.
- Examines the development of calligraphy from its origins in the early Islamic period to its diverse manifestations in different regions and eras.
- Students will analyze key texts, inscriptions, and manuscripts to understand the cultural and historical contexts in which these styles emerged.

2. Research Methods (CALL 902):

- Provides training in scholarly research methods specific to the study of historical calligraphy.
- Covers paleography (the study of ancient handwriting), codicology (the study of books as physical objects), and historiography (the study of historical writing).
- Emphasizes critical analysis, data collection, and the use of primary and secondary sources in calligraphy research.



3. Cultural Impact of Calligraphy (CALL 903):

- Explores the influence of calligraphy on Islamic art, architecture, literature, and society.

- Encourages students to critically assess the ways in which calligraphy has shaped and been shaped by social, political, and cultural developments throughout history.

4. Archival Studies (CALL 904):

- Introduces students to the principles and practices of archiving and preserving historical calligraphy documents.
- Covers techniques for conservation, digital archiving, and cataloging of manuscripts and artifacts.
- Focuses on the ethical considerations and best practices in handling, storing, and documenting fragile historical materials.

5. Capstone Research Project (CALL 905):

- The final assessment includes a portfolio review and oral defense of the student's research project before a panel of experts.
- The review focuses on the quality, originality, and rigor of the student's research, as well as their ability to present and defend their findings effectively.
- This assessment ensures that students are prepared to engage in scholarly research or pursue further studies in calligraphy.
