5. Course Breakdown:

1. Principles of Restoration (CALL 1101):

- Covers the foundational concepts and techniques of restoration, including the ethical considerations and decision-making processes involved in restoring calligraphic works.
- Introduces students to various materials used in Arabic calligraphy, such as inks, papers, and parchment, and the common types of damage they may encounter.

2. Conservation Techniques (CALL 1102):

- Focuses on the study of conservation methods, such as stabilization, cleaning, and protective measures for calligraphic pieces.
- Teaches students about controlling environmental factors (temperature, humidity, light) and how they affect the longevity of historical manuscripts.
- Provides training in the use of specialized conservation tools and materials.



3. Restoration Projects (CALL 1103):

- Offers hands-on experience in the restoration of calligraphic artworks, with projects that include repairing damaged paper, re-inking faded calligraphy, and treating mold or water damage.
- Provides practical exposure to real-world scenarios, allowing students to develop problem-solving skills and creativity in the restoration process.

4. Historical Preservation (CALL 1104):

- Explores the historical significance of calligraphy in the Arabic world and the importance of preserving these works for cultural heritage.
- Studies various preservation methods, including digital preservation techniques, archiving, and the creation of replicas or facsimiles.

5. Advanced Restoration Techniques (CALL 1105):

- Offers in-depth training in advanced restoration techniques, such as reconstructing missing parts of manuscripts, retouching, and addressing more severe forms of damage.
- Focuses on complex cases that require a combination of techniques, careful analysis, and creative problem-solving.
- Introduces advanced technologies used in restoration, such as infrared imaging and digital reconstruction.

6. Capstone Restoration Project (CALL 1106):

- A comprehensive project that serves as a culmination of the program, allowing students to apply their restoration skills in a real-world or simulated scenario.
- Students are required to select a damaged calligraphic piece and restore it to a state that reflects both its original form and historical significance.
- The project is evaluated based on the student's methodology, skill level, and adherence to conservation ethics.

7. Examination and Portfolio Review (CALL 1107):

- A final assessment that includes an examination of the student's knowledge of restoration and preservation techniques.
- Involves a portfolio review by a panel of experts, assessing the quality of the student's practical work throughout the program.
- The review emphasizes the student's ability to restore works authentically and preserve them according to international standards.



6. Career Opportunities:

Graduates of the Diploma in Arabic Calligraphy Restoration and Preservation can pursue various professional roles, including:

- **Art Restorer or Conservator:** Working in museums, galleries, archives, or private collections to restore and conserve Arabic calligraphy manuscripts and artworks.
- **Cultural Heritage Consultant:** Advising cultural institutions on the preservation of calligraphic works, manuscripts, and other artifacts.
- **Independent Conservation Specialist:** Offering freelance services in the restoration and preservation of calligraphic works.
